INTERVIEWEE: Three years. Yeah, I, I got a good memory. And not, not good memory. I, I remember rate very clearly. Yeah. Do you know at the beginning oh, we just hear some news. There's a city. The name is Wuhan, Wuhan, Hubei province. It's a, it's a middle city of China. Middle part of China. And somewhere we, we heard, heard about the government locked down the city. No one can get inside and no one can get out. Locked down the whole of the city. You know, Wuhan is a very developed city. Yeah. Like a



population, like economic is very, very huge. Very, very high. Very high. Yeah. I, I have a friend over there. And, it sounds because we never, we never experienced this before in China. I was born in 1982, 1982. We, we never so, suddenly we heard about it from the news. The report the Wuhan had been in lockdown. We don't know what's going on.

Something else. I, I again, I saw a lot of pictures or videos in Wuhan. The, a lot of people a lot of people make, make lie in hospital. But like a nurse, like doctor couldn't save, save their life.

So, maybe the government, like me, we never got through all of this. The government is a safe. They don't know how to do it, they didn't know how to do it.

They, they just lock every people at home and government sends some like vegetable, like instant noodles too our home, but the food couldn't apply enough. Yeah, the people just a stay at home and because it's a long time, more than one month, and people can't couldn't go outside, and even they can't go outside. All of the supermarkets or all of the stores were closed. They couldn't buy anything so all, all they, all they can do just stay at home and wait. If the food, if the food was out they, they were starved, starved. Yeah some people starved to death at home. Yeah.

It's a he's, he's a very famous director in Wuhan.

For Chinese, we would our visa, just to can stay in Thailand for one month. Just one month. If the, if time's up, we need two, two choices. Back to China or I got the second choice. I apply for, for 10 days. How to say that? I guess stay they're 10 days. So I, I stay in Bangkok, stay in Bangkok for 40 days, 40 days and after 40 days, I back to China.

And when we, when we get into our community, yeah. Our community like, not like here, yeah. Our community just a one community. The tall buildings like apartment about like that. Yeah. The security guard stands and the gate and, and you need to register all of your information, information and you can't get in the community. Yeah. And we will stay home, just stay home. Where we can, we can't, we can't get out any more.

INTERVIEWEE: Yeah. Yeah. We were three years while the economic is, I'll just say that. Economic it's go down, going down. Yeah. A lot. A lot of people can't survive. And the job for the apartment. Yeah.

Yeah.

Sometimes, maybe some things happen. I, I just like can't go anywhere. Maybe, maybe this epidemic, maybe in the future? Maybe something, another things happening. It's not safe, yeah. It's under control. Yeah. And, and all of them. A lot of people unemployed after that. And they couldn't get, they couldn't, they couldn't read. They read their family or children. Yeah. Because, because what, what's, what's a rate?
